Iowa Kids Score High

Students in Iowa public schools typically perform a full year above national average scores on standardized achievement tests. Recent results from the Iowa Tests of Basic Skills and Educational Development reveal that 94% of the Iowa school districts have an average student test score at or above the national median. In the elementary grades, Iowa students recorded composite scores in 1981 ranging from 6.4 months above the national composite grade-equivalent at the third grade level to 9.7 months above the national composite median on the Tests of Educational Development.

The 1,300 Iowa juniors raking the college admission Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) in 1981 recorded the highest composite state score in the nation. Iowans average 516 on the verbal section and 572 for mathematics; this compares with national averages of 426 for verbal and 467 for mathematics. ACT assessment, 24,000 Iowa students compiled an average mean score of 20.3. This compares with the national mean of 18.4.
