'Stairway to Yesteryear'

The restoration of the exterior and second floor of historic city hall began in July. First a new roof was put in place. Then all of the metal siding was removed. A window was discovered that had been covered with the old wood siding. This window has been restored. All of the window framing and stools had to be rebuilt. The original wood was damaged when the metal siding was

installed. Windows received new glass and restoration. Approximately eighty per cent of the old wood siding, a portion of which was native black walnut, was replaced with new cedar siding. The contractors are now in the process of painting the exterior. The paint scheme is the same as was used for the cupola and front entrance restoration: white, saddle brown and light grey. I must admit what has been painted really does look great. The tin ceiling has been delivered the light fixtures have been ordered. The interior color scheme has been determined and the stage curtain decision has been made. The restoration committee, Diane Conway and Lela Austin, have been busy. I am confident that you will like their decisions. The hall on the second floor will be named the 'W.C. Miller Family Hall', Miller Hall for short. The stage will be named the 'Tom and Phyllis Cox Stage', the Cox Stage for short.











Museum Activities
