



Polk City History

Polk City's railroad history is relatively short. In the 1860's when the railroads started west it was the aspiration of every town to be a stop on a main rail line. The railroad was touted as bringing economic prosperity to the community. Initially Polk City was not fortunate to have a rail line. Boone to the north and Des Moines to the south were chosen as main stops in central Iowa. Polk City with a population of approximately 600 was very disappointed. In 1874 the Des Moines & Minneapolis (narrow gauge) railroad was opened from Des Moines to Ames, passing through Polk City. Polk City citizens were pleased with the new line. The enthusiasm was short lived for in 1879 the narrow gauge line was removed after being purchased by the Chicago Northwestern Railroad. A new regular railroad was laid that bypassed Polk City by approximately two miles to the east of town. The town of Crocker sprung up overnight. Crocker became the closest access to the railroad from Polk City. A law suit was filed by a citizen of Polk City to gain a rail line through Polk City. As a result of the law action the railroad provided a 'spur' from Polk City Junction (about 3 miles north of Polk City) to the town of Polk City. This did provide some short term hopes that Polk City would continue to grow. The spur did not provide the economic boost that was hoped for. By 1902 the town's population had dropped to 450. 


